#### **Different Strokes for Different Folks**

One of the highlights of the upcoming Sukkot holiday is the *Arba Minim-4 Species*. Each one of these species is unique and has many *Halachot* associated with it, as is enumerated in the *Mishnah, Tractate, Sukkah, Chapter 3*. The Etrog (citrus) must be clean without any major blemishes. Of course, its stem and Pitom must be intact. The Lulav (palm frond)



must be complete, not dried out, and must be closed at its center. The Hadas (myrtl) must be fresh, and complete and grow in threes. The Arava (willow) must grow near the water and also be fresh and complete. There is a well known teaching that the Arba Minim represent four different categories of Jews. Simply put; Etrog-the Tzadik, Lulav-the Talmid Chacham (scholar), Hadas-the Bal Mitzvot (the one that does many acts of Mitzvot) and finally the Arava-the simple Jew.

Just as there are different types of Jews and people in general, so too with children. Each child is unique and brings something different to the table. Good education is realizing that every child learns in their own unique way.

We can take a lesson from the Arba Minim to be more attentive to our children and celebrate their differences, just as we cherish each and every one of the four species.
